A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

The following is a copy of Harry's Remembrance Day address

June 25th this year marked the 60th anniversary of the war in Korea (the forgotten war). It hardly gets a mention. It was the first war to be fought under the flag of the United Nations, when the heavily armed communist North Korea launched an attack across the 38th parallel against the South. American forces from nearby Japan rendered immediate assistance to the South and the UN called for help from other nations. Britain pledged to send an infantry brigade but the problem was where to find a spare brigade. We had the Russians breathing down our necks in Germany, we had just had the Berlin blockade and we could not afford to weaken our defenses there. So it was decided to call up reservists. I never met one reservist who was happy at being called up.

We had all just had six years of war, got demobed, married and started a family, the last thing we needed was another war. However, by joining the regular army and reserve we had made a commitment and had to go. Some of us had still not fully recovered from illness, or wounds from the last war. In this country there was no enthusiasm and little interest for a war in Korea. This was understandable, the whole nation was still battle weary and everyone was concerned with making a new life for themselves. In fact, many people had no idea where Korea was, never even heard of it. We were however committed to fight against communism.

The war in Korea was a bloody and brutal conflict, fought under harsh conditions, bitterly cold in winter when temperatures can drop to -40° 0 with -70° 0 of frost. In summer it was intense heat and dust, when wet it you were up to your neck in mud. Owing to the hilly nature of the country it was an infantryman's war and it was they who bore the brunt of the fighting. I was in the one armoured regiment, although we had many casualties it did not compare with the losses of the infantry regiments. Little has been told of the good work done by British Forces during the three years that the war lasted, or of the suffering of prisoners of war. The first major battle our forces were involved in was on New Years Day 1951, when several thousand Chinese forces swarmed out of the hills to attack a position held by the Royal Ulster Rifles and a small section of

8th Hussars. They held out all day and by night fall had inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. The Chinese resumed their attack as darkness fell breaking through American lines and surrounding the British who then had to fight their way out. As in all wars awful things happen. My friend, Ted Beckerley who was there writes a good account of events.

"I was driving a Cromwell tank, there were thousands of Chinese all around us, my periscope had been blown away by mortar fire. I was driving in darkness, on snow and ice, one of my tracks slid into a ditch where Chinese wounded were being treated by medic's, the medic's jumped out of the way, I must have squashed a dozen or more Chinese wounded. That memory will be with me until I die. By midnight we were out of ammunition, nothing left to fight with, our officer commanding had been killed, some managed to escape, the rest of us were taken prisoner. We spent our first night in captivity in a building, the windows of which had no glass. The toes of both Charlie Sadlers feet were frost bitten. We were forced to march north. We marched at night and slept by day to avoid the American Air Force. Just before daylight we would stop at a village, the guards would make all the occupants of houses move out of their bedrooms into the living room . We would then move into their bedrooms. We marched night after night over those Korean Hills so steep, so high, when you got to the top one you saw another in front of you even higher than the one you had just climbed. Charles Sadlers feet were now in a dreadful state due to frostbite. He had difficulty in walking. We took turns two at a time to support him, It was an awful experience, the journey was bad enough just supporting ourselves over those awful hills. But Sadler was in constant pain, sometimes weeping other times praying. We were given a meal of rice each morning and again in the evening before we set off for the nights march. After about ten weeks of marching through the Korean winter we reached a camp near the Yalo River which was to be our home for the next two years. Every night I said to myself the first verse of the hymn 'Abide With Me'. Lovely words and so comforting in the circumstances I found myself in. I used it as a prayer, a prayer that said everything for me."

This is just an account of one battle, , but it is the sort of fighting that went on for three years. Our Brigade, the 29th Infantry was relieved after a year. Over the next two years many other famous Regiments took part in some heavy fighting and all gave a good account of themselves. The losses they and the whole of the UN force inflicted upon the Chinese was the main reason they sued for peace at Panmunjon. But it all came at a heavy price in lives and suffering. Many National Servicemen died. Compare now the prosperity of the Republic of Korea with the North is proof that the action of the UN force was right.

At this time we remember all our comrades who died fighting for our freedom. Let us also remember all those who gave their lives in Korea. it was also in the cause of freedom.

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDER?

Volunteers work within a team and the cover they provide within the THREE PARISHES RESPONSE community they live or work in is designed to fit around their lifestyle child care. e.g. employment, other commitments.

This can mean that some groups are able to be on call for more hours or for longer, but this can BOXFORD/EDWARDSTONE/GRO also depend on the number of



volunteers in a group. Regardless of this, every hour that a group can be on call is of great benefit to their community because it provides extra emergency care when someone needs it.

People from all backgrounds volunteer, and do it for many different reasons. They may be a stay-at-home parent, retired, a student, a business person, or be a group working at a shopping centre or tourist attraction. Some volunteers have decided to become a responder because they themselves have been helped by such a scheme, and they've experienced first-hand the work of the group. Others enjoy volunteering generally and are active members of the place where they live, while many volunteers are clinicians who want to extend their day job for the good of their community.

CFRs attend calls of a life-threatening nature, which are known in the ambulance service as category A 999 calls. These include:-

- · cardiac arrest
- unconscious patients (or those suffering an altered level of consciousness)
- fitting patients
- breathing problems or altered breathing
- · chest pains
- diabetic patients

Because of the training volunteers receive and the equipment they carry, these types of calls can be dealt with sufficiently before ambulance staff arrive and CFRs remain on scene to assist ambulance colleagues to ensure the best care possible is given.

It's important to note that CFRs are not sent on calls such as road traffic

collisions, assaults, and patients suffering from psychiatric conditions because of safety issues, nor do they attend other calls deemed as inappropriate, for example pregnancy call-outs. Four groups in the east of England are trained in dealing with medical emergencies in patients under eight years of age.

Within the region it is estimated that volunteers provide nearly one million hours of cover and are available to respond to emergency calls, mainly through the night, and provide lifesaving treatment as required.



Planning Madness. You will have read under News from Clubs and Organisations that the Boxford Village Hall Management Committee was pleased to hear that Babergh's planning committee had voted against its own department's recommendation to refuse the planning application to replace the current windows in the hall with UPVC units. Fortunately we do live in a democracy and common sense prevailed with our elected members seeming to have a much better understanding of our needs than our un-elected conservation officers and planners. Unfortunately the new development in Boxford School to provide accommodation for a nursery with early morning and After school facilities was not so lucky. The new building, largely out of sight of the rest of the village was planned to have UPVC windows, not everyone's cup of tea but very practical. The planners and conservationists employed by the district council however, have ruled otherwise and instead of having maintenance free double glazed UPVC windows it is now necessary, amongst other unnecessary demands, for bespoke wooden windows to be installed at an extra cost of at least £3000.00, additional money that has had to be raised. With respect to Dr Belsey, how on earth under this criteria did the Arc get planning permission to be built in our beautiful village. One can understand and appreciate the need to conserve our historic buildings but this is ridiculous.

GROTON UNITED CHARITIES

AMENDMENT OF OBJECTS UNDER SECTION 74(2)(c) OF THE CHARITIES ACT 1973

Notices have been posted on the Parish Notice Boards of Groton and Boxford, and at the entrance to Groton Parish Church, to inform residents of the Ancient Parish of Groton that the Trustees of Groton United Charities have passed a resolution to broaden the objectives of the Charity.

The new clause covering the distribution of income will read as follows: 30. The annual income of the Charities shall be applied by the Trustees as follows:

- 1. For the benefit of the poor and needy in the Ancient Parish of Groton 2. For general charitable purposes within the Ancient Parish of Groton
- 2. For general charitable purposes within the Ancient Parish of Groton and, at the discretion of the Trustees, within adjacent parishes where this would also be of benefit to the inhabitants of the Ancient Parish of Groton.

This will enable Groton United Charities to make grants outside the original area covered, always provided that these would be for the benefit of Groton parishioners.





LISTED PLACES OF WORSHIP GRANT SCHEME A VICTORY FOR SUFFOLK

The Government has announced that the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme which, since 2001, has enabled listed churches (including all five in our benefice) to recover the VAT paid on vital repairs, will continue beyond March 2011. It was uncertain whether the scheme would survive the Government's October spending review, and there are some cutbacks in that, as from January 2011, VAT on professional fees and on repairs to organs and bells will cease to be recoverable. Also, there is to be an annual cap on the total amount paid out of £12m in 2011 and 2012 and £13m in 2013 and 2014.

Thanks are due to all those who wrote to their MP, and to the 9,000+ people who signed the petition organised by our diocese, which was in the forefront of the campaign to save the scheme.

THE ICENI PROJECT

A PLEA TO SIGN THE PETITION IN SUPPORT OF THIS VITAL LOCAL CHARITY

The Iceni Project in Ipswich has been providing quality drug treatment services to those affected by drug addiction for 12 years. Despite this valuable and recognised work, Iceni has lost out in a recent tender bidding process conducted by the Suffolk Drug and Alcohol Action Team ("Suffolk DAAT") to the growing emergence of large charities who are cutting swathes across the country, effectively running small charities like Iceni out of 'business'

Iceni has for over 10 years delivered an excellent and effective service to the very heart of the communities of Ipswich. It was instrumental in assisting many women off the streets of Ipswich and out of prostitution in the aftermath of the murders in 2006.

At the Diocesan Synod meeting on 6 November 2010 an emergency motion was passed expressing support for Iceni and dismay at the decision of Suffolk DAAT, which trustees say could force it to close in March of next year.

Soap Box

Next year we will have our local District Council elections. With Babergh due to merge with Mid Suffolk half way through the next term, these elections arguably have more relevance than usual. Parish Councils will not be merging as a result of this shake up in local government, though, and there will be 200 of them in the new, enlarged authority. And we will also have our Parish Council elections at the same time.

What worries me is that we will not have sufficient councillors standing next May. This is not just a problem for Little Waldingfield. Standing on the side of the road with the Great Waldingfield PC Chairman the other day on one of our Speedwatch forays, he also expressed the view that finding new – and particularly young – candidates for the Parish Council was a thankless task.

I know what he means. Of our band of seven, one is in his forties, one in her fifties, four in our late or middle sixties and one in his seventies. You can spot me in the age profile and I have to confess that our oldest PC member is not only willing to stand again, he has an energy that belies what we might expect from someone reaching their three score years and ten.

As it happens, our second youngest councillor plans to step down at the next election for quite understandable reasons. A replacement candidate – one with the most perfect pedigree – is now in doubt and it is by no means certain that all the other incumbents will be willing to put their names forward. Sadly, another young and locally born councillor stood down not so long ago, so I feel I am running out of options.

Nor is it just in the field of representing the village on the council closest to home that problems exist. The Speedwatch initiative, to which I referred earlier, is in danger of collapsing due to lack of support from volunteers prepared to give up an hour or so each month to stand at the side of the road and try to check the speed of motorists travelling through our village.

At present all volunteers from Little Waldingfield are members of the Parish Council. In other parishes they have been able to entice other villagers on to this initiative, which does appear to have had some success in persuading motorists to observe the speed limit, even if only momentarily. But to continue we need new blood. Sadly there have been those who have campaigned to employ measures such as this, but who

So if you feel a sense of community spirit, please let us know. We desperately need more people willing to give up just a little of their time to help maintain our local institutions. I look forward to hearing from you.

CARDENING IN DECEMBER HARRY BUCKLEDEE

Now is a good time to be planning and preparing for a new herbaceous border. Given the right treatment, a herbaceous border can give years of satisfaction and colour for a reasonable amount of money. I often hear

"Plant perenials, they will look after themselves." This is not so since everything needs attention to give of its best. As regards outlay, this can be cut to a minimum by begging pieces from people with established borders.

If possible, try to avoid sitting the border up against a high wall or hedge. Leaving a space between the backing wall or hedge not only makes easy access to the border for viewing and maintenance, but more importantly, it allows the plants to get the light and air needed to produce sturdy growth. Plants that are deprived of light and air become tall, weak and spindly and are easily broken down by wind and rain.

The choice of plants is important; although plants are adaptable to soils and situations, there are limitations to what they will put up with. For instance, if you place plants that like moist conditions in hot, dry situations, or shade-lovers in hot, full, sun, then you are sure to have

more than half the width of the border - they will otherwise look out of proportion. Planting distances vary from five per square metre for smaller plants to three per square metre for the more vigorous ones. Do not plant slow-growing plants next to vigorous growers as they will be quickly swamped. Mix plants with flat-topped flowers next to those of a spikey nature for better effect. The planting of a border prepared now should be left until early spring.

House plants. Many people receive house plants as Christmas presents and some of these require special attention:

Azaleas and Solanums (winter cherry) both need extra humidity and should be mist sprayed frequently with tepid water.

Cyclamens should not be watered until they show signs of flagging when they should be given only enough water to wet the whole compost. Make sure that only surface water is drained off.

Poinsettias should be kept away from draughts and fluctuating temperatures. These conditions and over-watering are usually the cause of leaves dropping.

Hyacinth bulbs that have been forced for early bloom need to be given plenty of light and enough water to keep the compost moist at all times. Too much water will cause the fleshy roots to rot, while insufficient water will cause the flower spikes to die off prematurely.

Now is the time to box up little pots of your assorted dried herbs, or packages of garden pot pourri or lavender bags, for presents. And to set aside the very late-flowering greenhouse chrysanthemums which prettily bunched with glossy leaves, berried holly, and sprigs of Eleagnus pungens aurea variegata - make such heartwarming nosegays with which to rush around at the end of the week to gardenless friends. Decide exactly what flowers you are going to use, and look out the containers that suit them best.

If Christmas gets to be too much why not escape into the garden and fork over a nice undemanding bed somewhere, or have another look at the seed catalogue and start a new list of 'musts', preferably out of reach of anybody.

Minutes of Newton Parish Council Meeting 8th September 2010

Present:

Councillors Colin Poole (Chairman), Roy Gardner, Rita Schwenk and Alan Vince.

Attending:

Peter Holbrook (Babergh District Councillor), PCSO Siobhan Hemmett and D Crimmin (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence:

Apologies received from Cllrs Flowers, Haylock and Wade. James Finch (Suffolk County Councillor) also sent his apologies.

Declaration of Interests: None were declared.

Minutes of Meeting held on 14th July 2010: The minutes of the meeting were approved and signed by the Chairman as a correct record. The meeting adjourned at 7.37pm for the Public Forum (Appendix A) and reconvened at 8.17pm

Correspondence and Člerks Report (Appendices B & C): Following a review of the Correspondence the councillors resolved that:

a.Clerk to complete the SALC survey on NPC's behalf

b.Clerk to arrange a visit to the Recycling centre for a Thursday in November

c.Clerk to distribute BDC's Babergh Development Framework consultation documentation to all councillors.

Following a review of the Clerk's Report there was no further action required.

Finance:

a.All cheques signed and due for signing, as itemised in Appendix D, were authorised by the councillors. The councillors also noted the income received since the last meeting and reviewed the Statement of Accounts against the budget and the bank reconciliation against the bank statements.

b.After reviewing the Asset Register against the quotation for insurance the councillors resolved to renew the insurance with Aviva.

c.The councillors resolved to give Newton PCC £350 towards the churchyard maintenance.

d.The Councillors resolved to request a locality budget grant from James Finch towards the cost of the fence for the play equipment.

Planning:

a.The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/10/00919 Red House Farm, Sudbury Road - erection of two-storey rear extension and resolved to support the application. The councillors were surprised that no mention of the agricultural land either side of the farm, from the boundaries with Gothic House and Jordan's, has been made as all the land is being maintained in line with the farm's garden. The councillors would like to understand any plan that the applicant has for the agricultural land.

b.The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/10/01040 Land to rear of Gothic House, Sudbury Road - change of use of agricultural land to domestic garden and resolved to support the application.

c.The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/10/01042 The Birches, Sudbury Road - erection of single-storey front and rear extensions and erection of detached double garage (amended scheme to that approved under B/07/01047) and resolved to support the application.

d.No other planning applications had been received since the agenda was posted.

e.The status of previous applications, reviewed by NPC were as follows: Playground and Asset Maintenance Programme

a.The councillors reviewed the revised quote by Wicksteed for the installation of an embankment slide, with grass matting at the top and bottom of the slide, and resolved that the order be placed with Wicksteed for the equipment at a total installed price of £3,628 + VAT. They also noted Babergh District Council's decision to grant NPC £1921.25 from the Section 106 money allocated to the village towards the project.

b.A cheaper quote has been obtained by Cllr Gardner for the materials required to erect the fence and the project will commence once the slide has been installed. The Clerk was asked to arrange a contractor to realign the entrance to the bridge equipment so that the fence could be installed.

c.There were no issues reported re the council assets.

Tour of Britain cycle race: Bunting will be placed along the edge of the Green and the A134 on the evening of Thursday 16th September. However the cycle ride planned for Saturday 18th September to mark the opening of the cycle track and the TOB race has been postponed until a later date.

C&LG Consultation on referendums on excessive Local Council tax increases: The councillors reviewed the proposal to hold a referendum in the parish should NPC increase the precept beyond thresholds yet to be defined by the Communities and Local Government Department The councillors were very concerned that even if the residents agreed with the increase of precept at the referendum, the cost of £1,000 would still fall upon NPC to pay. The councillors agreed that this measure should not apply to any Town or Parish Council which has a precept of less than £100,000 and agreed the response to be sent to the C&LG.

BDC meeting with the Parishes: The councillors resolved that Cllr Gardner would represent NPC at the meeting on 11th November.

Village Hall and Trust representatives update: Neither the Trust nor Village Hall had held a meeting since the last reports.

Question to Chairman:

- Cllr Poole will be meeting Suffolk Sport's Tracey Brownlow to see if any of the Fit Village initiatives could be used in Newton.
- The councillors agreed that an appeal by the contractor via the Newsletter would be the most appropriate method of obtaining a strimmer for the grass cutting.
- The councillors deplored reports from the Golf Club that despite the installation of new dog bins in the village, bags of dog faeces are still being dumped in golf tee markers and hedges around the course.

Date of NPC Meeting: The next scheduled meeting will be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 10th November 2010.

The meeting closed at 9.43pm.

Appendix A Public Forum: PCSO Siobhan Hemmett gave the police report. The report tonight covers the period from 1st July 2010 through to the 31st August 2010. During this time 5 crimes have been recorded within the parish, this compares to 3 crimes for the same period last year. The breakdown of crime is 2 Vehicle Crime – a vehicle was damaged whilst it was being driven on the A134 during the evening of 2nd August and a male was charged with Driving with Excess Alcohol on the A134 during the early hours of 20th August. 2 Thefts - a wheeled bin was stolen from the car park of the Village Hall during the afternoon of 30th July And no publicity has been requested for the second theft, which occurred sometime between 17th and 19th August. 1 Other report - a male is on police bail for Possession of Class B drug whilst on the A134 during the early hours of 20th August. She also updated councillors that PC Chris Garrod was joining the SNT and with the schedule of Community Priority Setting meetings.

Peter Holbrook updated councillors on the proposed merger of BDC and Mid Suffolk DC as well as the next stage of the Babergh Development Framework consultation. The Chairman read the report submitted by James Finch.

The councillors were very appreciative of George Davey's generous donation of time and machinery in order that the site was prepared for the installation and requested the Clerk to write a letter of thanks to him.
- Cllr Gardner outlined the project for the fencing of the play equipment area which will commence in the coming weeks. The Clerk will raise the order for the materials.

Minutes of Little Waldingfield Parish Council Meeting 2 November 2010

Present: B Tora, P Baker, R Mitchell, M Ewen, C Bowden. D Kiddy

Cllr J Antill and 1 member of the public

PC Anise Howe Apologies: S Coomber Declarations of Interest: None.

Police Matters: A written report was received confirming there had been no reported crimes since our last meeting. PC Howe reported that there are no SNT priorities affecting Little Waldingfield and invited members to raise any issues at the next SNT meeting to be held at Boxford VH on 18 November.

P Baker and the clerk attended a meeting of the local Speedwatch partnership on 1st November and can report that since the Scheme started in April there have been 41 speed surveys undertaken with 235 drivers being reported. Within Little Waldingfield 21 drivers have been reported for exceeding the speed limit. To ensure the continuing success of the Scheme by encouraging drivers to remain within the 30 mph speed limit through the village more volunteers are needed.

Village Matters: Cllr Antill updated the Council on previously discussed planning matters. The container in a garden at Grove Avenue can remain on site as it is used as an office and classed as for domestic purposes and it does not cover more than 50% of the garden area. It seems likely that that retrospective planning permission will be granted for the retention of the barn extension at Park Farm despite the previous dismissal of the appeal by the Planning Inspector. She also spoke briefly about the current consultation period on the Local Development Framework and the workshop of 28 October attended by B Tora and M Ewen.

Minutes of the last Meeting: These were agreed as a true record and signed.

Matters Arising: C Bowden has been informed that it is unlikely that any changes will be made to the bus timetables within the next 5 years. With the severe cuts to the budget Suffolk CC are not in a position to install a footway down to the Lavenham Road. The potholes reported following the previous meeting have been filled in. An excellent service provision by Suffolk Highways.

Financial Matters: The payment for the 2nd instalment of the precept has been received from Babergh DC. The precept for 2011/12 must be set at the December meeting, so please email any requests for budgetary consideration to the clerk. A request for funding has been received from the Suffolk Association for the Blind, and this will be discussed at the next meeting.

Planning Matters: Permission has been granted for tree works adjacent to The Swan.

Correspondence: The Standards Board regime which covers the Code of Conduct is to be abolished. The intention is to replace the Code of Conduct with a system for registering Councillor's personal interests.

National Grid Proposals: No decision has yet been made. The Government has requested reasons for why National Grid does not wish to underground cables.

Telephone Kiosk: C Bowden will enquire if there is a termination of electricity charge made.

Village Website: The clerk has not yet been successful in uploading information to a page. She will seek further guidance from onesuffolk.

Footpaths: A waymark near Archers Farm has been knocked over and councillors will re-erect it.

Newsletter: R Mitchell will submit a report. A Speedwatch article to encourage more volunteers has still to be agreed for submission.

Churchyard: Nothing to report.

Any Other Business: Details of the timetable for next year's election have been received. Councillors will try to generate interest amongst residents to stand. We will not require poll cards because of the additional costs. The member of the public present enquired if any progress has been made regarding the provision of a bus shelter. The Chairman replied that due to cost it is unlikely to happen.

Dates for the next meetings for the life of this Council were set for 25 January, 1 March, 19 April and 24 May (Annual Parish Meeting).

Meetings of Boxford Parish Council held in October 2010 Meeting on 4th October

Finance: In addition to the usual business, it was reported that the Church Clock continues to run fast and it was agreed to inform the contractor accordingly. The budget review showed expenditure at 40% of budget at this half way point in the financial year. The External Audit Report was shared with Council showing everything to be in order. The Chairman took the opportunity to thank the Clerk for her hard work in the

preparation of the Accounts and Audit papers. It was agreed to apply for County Cllr James Finch's Locality Budget to contribute towards the Village Hall windows and a new street light for School Hill.

Reports from Members: It was noted that the Parish Council were responsible for repairs to the wall surrounding the Churchyard. Quotations for the more urgent repairs would be sought. The Memorials in the Cemetery and Churchyard have been checked and no immediate issues were noted. Similarly the Bus Shelter has been inspected and no issues were found. It was reported that the drains in Stone Street Road were blocked. This has since been reported to the County Council. It was agreed to thank County Highways for the excellent condition of Wash Lane.

Planning: Confirmations from Babergh District Council:-

- 1) Permission had been granted to timber clad rear extension also with zinc roof and new window arrangement at 38 Swan Street.
- 2) Work was approved to remove 8 trees to make way for the Extended Schools Building at Boxford School.

The following were discussed: -

- a) Proposed removal of protected copper beech tree at Peyton Hall Farm, Stone Street
- b) Erection of single and two storey rear extension, outbuilding, entrance gates and associated fencing at Greenbanks, 5 Ellis Street
- c) Proposed single storey side extension at 20 Holbrook Barn Road
- d) Consulted as adjoining parish on application to vary planning conditions at Copella

Meeting on 18th October

Police Report: PCSO Jamie Fudge reported on crimes from 13th September to 10th October. He confirmed reports would now cover Edwardstone and Groton following a request. During this time 3 crimes were recorded compared to 6 crimes for the same period last year. There was a burglary of jewelry and cash. An outbuilding on Sand Hill was broken into with pressure washer stolen and finally diesel was stolen from a parked vehicle in Boxford Lane. There were no crimes in Edwardstone or Groton during the same period. PCSO Fudge then read from Country wide issues affecting the Police Force. He confirmed the current crime rate for the County was at it lowest for a decade and 88% of people in Suffolk feel safe where they live. He confirmed Suffolk is a low cost force, but in line with Police Forces across the Country they are facing an unprecedented financial situation. They are facing a cut in funding of at least 20 Million over the next 4 years. However, he stressed this will not affect the availability of police officers to respond to emergencies. Members then took the opportunity to raise issues in Boxford including anti-social behaviour on the playing field, an allotment shed window being broken and alcohol cans found in the vicinity. It was also mentioned that the school bus has no room to turn around at the entrance to Daking Avenue due to cars blocking its path. PCSO Fudge agreed to investigate these points. He confirmed he has already started to approach people regarding parking their vehicles on junctions.

Babergh District Council Report: District Cllr Bryn Hurren advised the Planning Committee were due to decide the application for replacement windows in the Village Hall. Cllr. Gates agreed to attend on behalf of the Parish Council. Cllr. Hurren advised there may be some disruption to rubbish collections due to a pay dispute. He confirmed that long stay parking is now being charged at both Sudbury and Hadleigh town centres. He encouraged support to the Quay Theatre.

County Council Report: County Cllr James Finch provided a detailed report covering the New Strategic Direction, the future of residential care homes and his visit to Boxford on 1st October to see first hand some of the parking issues around school pick up times. He did not believe the addition of the playgroup building would add to the parking issues due to phased timings of arrival and departure.

Housing Needs: It was confirmed that feedback was awaited from Suffolk ACRE in relation to the Housing Needs Survey.

Correspondence: The Clerk circulated her report ahead of the meeting. Arrangements were finalised in respect of Boxford Conservation Area Appraisal Consultation. It was agreed for Cllrs Fincham-Jacques, Green, Norman and Rule to attend the Babergh Meeting with Town and Parish Councils. The question of increasing numbers of ducks in Ash Street was raised by a resident and it was agreed to install signs requesting that the ducks are not fed. The Parish Council was supportive of the Church Warden's proposal to plant a memorial tree in the Churchyard.

Cemetery: Members of the Cemetery sub committee agreed to carry out a gentle clean of the war memorial ahead of Remembrance Sunday.

Planning The following were discussed: -

A) Proposed two storey extension at 17 Gunary Close

B) It was agreed to arrange a site meeting at Admyra, 24 Swan Street in respect of the amended plans to remove existing single storey lean to extension at rear and erect a two storey extension.

Boxford School News


Phew! Many years ago, more than I care to remember, I used to be a keen footballer. This often involved a game on Saturday afternoon followed by another game on a Sunday morning. One season I was asked to play for Clacton Town, in what I think was the old Eastern Counties League, and I remember one Saturday afternoon a game at Stowmarket. As usual we travelled to the game by car and we all arrived in good time with the exception of one car. With seconds to spare a car came roaring into the car park and a rather green, dishevelled looking figure emerged from the back of the car. He staggered into the changing room and announced that the driver had driven like a maniac and that had he slowed down to 60mph he would have got out! With the pace of educational change happening at the moment I am beginning to feel like the player in the back of that car. Since the general election we have had Free Schools, Academies, The Pupil Premium, pension reviews, changes to school admissions, new funding streams and believe it or not yet another review of the curriculum. I am not sure whether to be excited by the new opportunities that change inevitably brings or depressed at the possibility that through it all we are likely to face much greater levels of responsibility alongside diminishing funding. All I hope is that all of the hard work we have done to improve standards for all of our pupils is not going to be lost. Over the past ten years staffing in schools has increased considerably, especially in the area of support staff. This has had a considerable impact on standards and has ensured that all children have had access to the levels of support they deserve. To cut budgets would inevitably lead to reductions in staffing and as always it will be the most vulnerable least able children who will suffer.

In addition to the pace of educational change already mentioned the pace in school is hotting up as we approach, dare I say it, Christmas. This Friday we will be having a special day to raise money for Children in Need and then it will be full steam ahead as we prepare for the usual end of term festivities. I think I can hear a rousing chorus of the 'Rocking Shepherd' as I write. This year the older children will be performing The

Innkeepers Story based on the book Jesus' Christmas Party. For those of you who are ex pupils and parents it's the 'round the back' one! The Nursery as always are doing their own production entitled The Sleepy Shepherd.

The FOBS are busy preparing for the Christmas Fayre which will be taking place on Saturday 4th December from 2 – 4pm. As usual there will be a wide range of stalls and activities as well as a visit from the main man himself. I hope to see many of you there.

Finally at this time of year parents of pre school children are asked to submit applications for their child's place in school. If you have registered with us you will have received a copy of the form in the post, if not and you would like to apply for a place you need to contact us. As always people in the school's catchment area get priority but only if they apply by the deadline date in January. If you need further details please contact the school office on 01787 210332, they will be pleased to help.






