Yes - This is a new application and therefore it is very important that you register your child(ren) again.


MILDEN SINGERS CHRISTMAS CONCERT

THE FEBRUARY LETTER FROM REV JUDITH

WHO IS MISSING?

Take a look at the pictures on this page and ask, who is missing? The answer of course is:

YOU ARE!

OK - this is a bit of a cheat, on my part, I admit, since all these photos were taken at my previous church in Coggeshall. However, I thought they would show you adults getting happily stuck in to working with children in the church.



You'll notice that there are even men helping too!

Church, to me, is not really church, unless we have people of all ages and all backgrounds making the Christian journey and exploring the Christian faith together. Not only that, but we should be helping our children and young people to explore and develop their own natural and



innate spirituality. To do this is both a great privilege and great fun. But it is also hard work!

So this month's letter is not so much a letter but more of a plea for help!

Every month, there are two services in the benefice which aim to be extraspecially family-friendly: the All Age Service at Boxford (first Sunday of the month) and the Family Service at

Newton (fourth Sunday of the month) - both at eleven O'clock.

I don't wear formal robes for these and some of the songs are sung to the guitar, or using a CD, instead of the organ. There is always an interactive story and a craft, drawing or dressing up activity for the younger children to take part in. Older children can be involved in doing the readings, writing the prayers, playing the instruments many are learning at school. There is also a short, informal reflection to give the adults present something to chew over too.

I am looking for ways to bring some new energy, zest and excitement into all the things we do with children in our churches, but I can't do it alone!

What I need now, is YOU!

<u>Parents</u> – you are especially wanted! But also anyone who can help in any of the following ways:

- coming up with ideas
- designing or distributing flyers and posters
- reading the Bible story, taking part in short drama sketches
- helping the children to make things, draw, paint, play music, write prayers, do drama
- bringing your own instrument to play
- operating the CD player, laptop, projector and screen



Do think if you can help in any of these ways – for the children's sake – they deserve it!



Journeys

On one of those wonderfully quiet, thoughtful and reflective days at year's close during that period between the festivity we know as Christmas and that which we know as New Year, 28th of December to be precise, I was walking through Boxford to post a birthday card, when I espied a good friend of many years' standing, one Mr Brian Tora, accompanied by the always delightful and ever charming Mrs Elizabeth Tora, outside the recently re-opened and tastefully re-furbished Fleece Hotel. They were meeting mutual friends for a drink. "I'll see you in there shortly then. Just got to go to the post" I said.

On entering the bar, and very nearly tripping over myself in the process, (God, it can be fun being disabled sometimes!) I promptly said my 'Helloo's' and took a seat on one of the famed ample bar stools. Very soon Brian and I were in conversation relating our respective experiences with recent illness, his with cancer and mine with stroke, during which it occurred to me just how jolly lucky we both were to be having the conversation at all!

In his December 2011 SoapBox, Brian had described his son Tom's calling to Christianity and how he found his way to the 'Journey' in the depths of Berkshire, itself an inspiring tale. Brian closes his piece with these words. "Life, it is said, is just a series of journeys. And travelling should be, and usually is, fun. I enjoyed this particular journey," referring to Tom's Christian adventure. "I hope you have too."

He and I have been on journeys, the likes of which both of us I would imagine would have preferred to have avoided. But I suspect that part of the reason as to why we could enjoy each others' company that day was because we were holding glasses at that bar that were at least half full, and which, for some extraordinary reason, never became half empty! Keep up! ?! And believe me we both enjoy a good drink! As indeed we discovered as we recounted past serious 'wining and dining' adventures that we had had in some of the 'finer' houses of Suffolk!

My point? The word 'Journey', much used these days, has been very much a part of my own rehabilitation, as indeed it has for Brian. It is, if you like, a philosophy. Couple it with Brian's words alluding to the notion that 'travelling should be, and usually is, fun' and one begins to understand and appreciate exactly what is entailed in overcoming adversity, in whatever form it may take. And thus armed with such attitude of mind, one is then able to conquer a particular mountain of adversity, and in the process of which, gain strength as a result.

So, as we take on the challenges of the New Year that present themselves, let us all do so with a positive heart and spirit to succeed. The mountains beckon! Nick Athorne

Must You Go? My Life with Harold Pinter by Antonia Fraser

In 1975 Antonia Fraser was at a party given for Harold Pinter to celebrate the end of a successful play. Later that evening Antonia bid goodbye to Harold. His reply was 'Must you go?' What a chat up line! She fell for his dark twinkling eyes, enigmatic charm and recklessly she replied, 'No, it's not absolutely essential.' So began a touching love story. They were both married with children, and their affair was scandalised by the tabloids. It is a miracle how she found time for Harold Pinter, her MP husband Sir Hugh Fraser, her six children plus her writing career!

She was posh, the daughter of Lord Longford, a catholic. Pinter was an atheist, the son of a Jewish tailor from the East End. But their differences had long been buried. They were not teenagers but mature people, and they saw themselves as bohemians with a common cause for justice in the world.

Antonia Fraser is a highly regarded author of historical biographies and novels and she kept a diary. Harold Pinter is one of the most influential playwrights of the twentieth century. He was awarded the Nobel Prize in

This book is a tribute to their thirty-three years together, taken from her

diary. It is beautifully written, uplifting and warm. Not only does it tell their story but it gives us an insight into the lives of their influential and glamorous friends. They stay in fancy hotels, eat at expensive restaurants and wear designer clothes. No wonder they were short of money! Strangely, there is little mention of the children. The story has some amusing extracts that will make you laugh out loud, but the final part is overshadowed by his illness. He dies on Christmas Eve 2008. Antonia's last words to him are 'Must you go? Goodnight, sweet prince, and flights of angels sing you to your rest.'

YOUR COUNTRY LODGES NEED YOU!



Attention all former Women's Land Army Girls and their families! The fantastic new Stoke by Nayland Country Lodges are almost complete. They are situated above the second large lake at Stoke by Nayland Hotel, Golf & Spa, on the former Leavenheath Womens' Land Army Hostel site, and command amazing views over the picturesque golf courses and rolling Constable Country.

We are looking to collect as many photographs and memorabilia items from the original wartime site as possible and require your assistance in finding these! We would also love to hear your stories so that we can include them in the proposed display in the unique original Water Tower which we have preserved as a memorial to all your hard work.

The five new self-catered luxury Lodges – which each sleep from two to ten guests - will be welcoming their first occupants in April and we wish to share your stories with our visitors.

Bill and Devora Peake bought the Land Army Site and surrounding acreage from the War Agricultural Department immediately after the war and adapted the Land Army Hostel to house pigs, chickens and turkeys over the next 20 years or so. Since then the site has been derelict until last year when building started on the Lodges.

The land around the Hostel site has therefore been farmed by the Peake family since the war, with mainly arable crops at first and now apples, strawberries, raspberries and blueberries. Most of that acreage however was transformed by Bill and Devora in the 1970s into the two championship golf courses that formed Stoke by Nayland Golf Club, which the next generation of the family have since developed into the Hotel, Golf and Spa complex that it is today.

Managing Director, Susanna Rendall, says "As a family we are delighted to have been able to create these beautiful Country Lodges from what was a derelict site on our land for so long. At the same time we recognise that it is important to remember the significance of the site's history both locally and nationally. Hence our appeal to anyone who can come to us with their memories of living and working here during the war so that we can give them a permanent place in our Water Tower to share with our guests and community in the future."

The Town of Groton lies on Fishers Island Sound between the Thames and Mystic Rivers where from times past its rugged hills and lush green woods have sloped down to sandy beaches and rocky shores. When Dutch explorer Adrian Block charted the coast in 1614, this was the stronghold of the Pequot Indians, the dominant native tribe, who were displaced in 1637 when Captain John Mason led a punitive expedition against their Mystic fort

GROTON CONNECTICUT

Groton was settled by Europeans as part of New London when John Winthrop, Jr., came from Massachusetts Bay in 1646 to found Pequot Plantation at the mouth of the Thames. By 1705 the population east of the river had increased sufficiently for the General Court to allow the inhabitants to incorporate as a separate town, which they named Groton in honor of the Winthrop estate in England.

Early settlers were primarily farmers, but they turned early to shipbuilding and the maritime trade to supplement their livelihood scratched from the rocky soil. Groton vessels traded with Boston and New York and soon found their way to the West Indies and across the Atlantic.

During the American Revolution the town was active against the tyranny of King George, sending out privateers to prey on British commerce. Perhaps in reprisal for their success, superior troops led by the traitor Benedict Arnold attacked Fort Griswold on Groton Heights Sept. 6, 1781. The one-sided battle ended with a dreadful massacre of the brave American defenders. The site is marked with a 134-foot monument and is now Fort Griswold Battlefield State Park.

After the war shipping and commerce boomed, and mill wheels turned on every stream. Groton seamen sailed to the ends of the earth hunting seals and whales. Major shippards developed. At West Mystic, Maxson & Fish built clipper ships and the Civil War ironclad Galena. After the war, in 1868, a Navy Yard was established on the Thames River, which during World War I was officially commissioned as a submarine base.

Groton became known as the Submarine Capital of the World when the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics delivered 74 diesel submarines to the Navy in World War II. This was followed in 1954 with the launch of the USS Nautilus, the world's first nuclear-powered submarine, now permanently berthed at Goss Cove near the Submarine Base.

Today Groton is a regional center for commerce and industry while its shoreline location and its many historical sites have made the region a prime tourist attraction.





Police Notice

Now the nights are getting longer and the temperature is dropping, I feel it would be appropriate to give some road safety advice. A safe journey starts in the preparation the night before. Check the weather forecast, if it's going to be cold, put a protective sheet over the windscreen (available from most good vehicle accessory shops) or get up 15 minutes earlier to allow enough time to fully defrost your car before you set off. Please don't pour hot water on your windscreen. Although the windscreen companies will love all the extra business from the shattered windscreen, I'm sure you can think of better ways of spending your time and hard earned money.

One mistake that many drivers make when it snows, is to only clear the snow from the windows of their vehicles. It is important to clear the snow from the bonnet and the roof of your car. The reason for this is that whilst you are driving along, the snow on your bonnet will be blown up onto your windscreen, instantly obscuring your vision and potentially leading to you having an accident. Likewise, the snow on the roof of your car will be blown off onto the windscreen of the vehicle following you, causing exactly the same result to their windscreen. Do you really want to be responsible for causing an accident?

Think carefully if your journey is really necessary. If it is, allow a greater stopping distance between you and the car in front especially on wet or icy roads. Generally there is a 2 second rule on normal dry roads, you should at least double this on wet or icy roads.







Soap Box

Visiting a local hostelry not so very long ago – something that is far from rare in my case – I became embroiled in a somewhat heated discussion on the merits of Speedwatch. This scheme, introduced to reduce the incidence of speeding through our villages, clearly attracts opposing views. Apparently, according to one of the participants in this lively debate, Boxford had not been able to attract sufficient volunteers for the scheme to operate – and good job too, was the conclusion.

It happens that I am involved in our own Speedwatch initiative and have been since its introduction a couple of years ago. Don't get me wrong. I'm not a do-gooder, anxious to slap a speeding fine on anyone with the gall to travel through our village at 31 mph or more. And I have been caught speeding myself – fortunately not too often. But I have found the exercise of standing by the side of the road measuring how fast vehicles are travelling when they fly past my house rather revealing.

First I should explain. Speedwatch is not an attempt to swell police coffers with more speeding fines. Indeed, speeding tickets cannot be issued as a consequence of the activities of a Speedwatch team. The speed is measured by the same type of device that might be used by the police and, if a vehicle exceeds the speed limit by a certain amount (which has varied), then the licence number is noted and the details forwarded to the police.

The correct procedure then is for the police to write to the offending motorist, advising them of what has been measured and no further action is taken. Unless, that is, a speeding motorist crops up again on a Speedwatch beat. Then the unlucky driver could well receive a visit from the Old Bill, but still no prosecution is possible. It is all designed as a deterrent – and certainly my experience is that when motorists see the Speedwatch sign at the side of the road, they moderate their speed.

Of course, some drivers do take exception and occasionally there is a little verbal abuse from the car when a number is noted down. For the most part, though, motorists take this in good heart and I would like to think we have achieved some moderation of speed through our village, which on occasions in the past has resembled Le Mans more than Little Waldingfield.

There is training for those that take part and the "gun" we use is calibrated each time it is used. We have also been fortunate in our village in attracting sufficient volunteers for us to be able to run our own scheme,

rather than combine with other villages, though we all share the equipment. There is always room for more to help spread the load, though, so if you are interested, do contact Rick Ridgeon who runs the scheme on behalf of the Parish Council. His contact details are on our website and in the Parish Council section of this magazine.

I was disappointed to find such a negative attitude to this particular initiative when discussing it in the pub. The debate was good hearted enough, but if people wish to try to moderate behaviour of others – as we have tried to do in Little Waldingfield – then it would be nice to think one's neighbours are supportive. If indeed Boxford did fail to find sufficient volunteers, then that is also sad. We don't want a death in our village to prompt more intrusive traffic calming measures – which probably couldn't be afforded by the County Council anyway. So donating a little time seems to me to be worthwhile. I would like to think others believed so too, even if they don't take part.

GARDENING IN FEBRUARY HARRY BUCKLEDEE

Deciduous hedges, like privet, hawthorn, and beech which have become overgrown and difficult to clip, can be cut hard back to the main stem on one side, leaving the other side until next year or the year after.

Clear the dead tops from herbaceous plants. Fork lightly between the plants and feed with a slow acting fertiliser like John Innes Base fertiliser, hoof and horn or any long lasting fertiliser which is high in Phosphates and Potash but low in Nitrogen.

Chrysanthemum stools which have been left in the ground should be checked to make sure they have not been lifted loosened by the frost. Remove all weeds from around the stools and re-firm the soil around the roots. Scatter slug pellets around the plants as slugs can cause a lot of damage to the young shoots emerging from ground level.

Complete the pruning of fruit trees and hardy shrubs. Wall fruit trees should be given a dressing of bone meal and a general fertiliser, stone fruits will benefit from some hydrated lime. The buds of wall and bush fruits are frequently attacked by bull finches, cotton, intertwined amongst the branches will deter them. Pruning of silver foliage plants and shrubs is best left until April as severe frosts can damage young shoots.

Weather permitting, Hybrid T and Floribunda roses should be pruned at the end of the month. Cut out all diseased and frost damaged wood and prune healthy shoots back to two buds. Hard pruning produces better blooms and prolongs the life of the bush. After pruning spray the stumps with Armillatox Soap Based Outdoor Cleaner, used as directed by the manufacturers, to kill off spores of black spot which may be lying dormant ready to infect new shoots as they form. There will still be the need to make the fortnightly preventative sprays throughout the growing season against black spot, mildew and rust. Although Armillatox has proved to be a safe and effective fungicide, the powers that be have decided for some reason to ban it. Armillatox has therefore become 'Armillatox Soap Based Outdoor Cleaner' so taking it out of the pesticides regulations - the formulation remains the same. Armillatox is useful as a patio cleaner and for a wide range of other applications.

Dormant fuchsias should be cut back to within three buds from the base, have all the old compost shaken off the roots and washed clean. Washing off all the old compost from the roots is one way of ensuring that you get rid of any vine weevil grubs which may be lurking there. Any large roots

can be trimmed back and always re-pot down to one size smaller pot. Place the pots on the bench with a bit of bottom heat and spray the wood with tepid water twice a day to encourage new shoots.

If the weather is kind at the end of the month we should see the first blooms of crocus, primroses and polyanthus. These blooms often attract the attention of small birds, all that is needed to protect them is a few strands of cotton supported by small twigs.

If you have a heated greenhouse and can maintain a temperature of 50° - 55° a start can be made sowing summer bedding and vegetable seeds, if no heat is available it is best to delay sowing until March. It should be remembered that many plants are attacked at the seedling stage by diseases that affect them at soil level. Whole trays of seedlings may collapse caused by disease known by 'damping off' which is caused by various fungi. Best control is to water the compost at sowing time with chestnut compound, and at two week intervals after germination until the plants are established. Avoid over-watering.

Begonia tubers should be started into growth now for pot culture or for an outdoor display in tubs or borders. Plant the tubers upwards in a seed tray filled with a peat based compost and pot up individually when well rooted. Try tubers of the non-stop variety, this is a multi flora type and as its name suggests will flower non-stop until autumn frosts. One of the most adaptable of bedding plants is the fibrous rooted Begonia semperflorens, it is tolerant of all types of soil, shady or sunny positions, and will do well in dry or wet summers its flowers being unaffected by rain. Seed of B, semperflorens should be sown now as it requires a long season of growth to get good plants by the end of May. If you do not want to raise them yourself, seedlings are available now at garden centres.

At the end of the month, weather permitting, roses can be pruned. Hybrid T's should be pruned back to three buds from the base, Floribunda's to four or five buds. Don't be afraid to cut them back hard - rose bushes will last longer, stay healthier and give a better display by hard pruning. There is still time to plant new rose bushes and other deciduous shrubs and trees. The planting of evergreens is best delayed until the soil warms up.

Ferns are in need of potting on if the soil ball shows full of roots when topped out of the pot. Repot in John Innes Nol and remove any dead or discoloured fronds.

Parish Council Matters

Newton Parish Council meeting 9th November

Present: Councillors Colin Poole (Chairman), Roy Gardner, Lee Parker, Paul Presland, Rita Schwenk and Philip Taylor.

Attending: James Finch (Suffolk County Councillor), Peter Holbrook (Babergh District Councillor) and D Crimmin (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Apologies received from Cllr Vince who is on holiday and PC Garrod.

Declaration of Interests: Cllrs Gardner and Schwenk declared personal and prejudicial interests in items 11/134a as they were members of the Village Hall Management Committee who are seeking payment of hall hire fees. The councillors left the meeting while the item was discussed.

Minutes of Meeting held on 28th September 2011: The minutes of the meeting were approved and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

Public Forum: The issues raised during the public forum are contained in Appendix A

Correspondence (Appendix B): The councillors reviewed the Correspondence received and requested the Clerk to ask villagers to return any papers belonging to NPC if they had any in their possession.

Clerks Report (Appendix C): Following a review of the Clerk's Report by the councillors there was no further action required.

Finance: a.All cheques signed and due for signing, as itemised in Appendix D, were authorised by the councillors. The councillors also noted the income received since the last meeting and reviewed the Statement of Accounts against the budget and the bank reconciliation against the bank statements.

b. The councillors reviewed the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations being planned and agreed a £5,000 budget for the event subject to at least 50% funding being obtained from other organisations. Newton Green Trust to be approached regarding the budget.

c. The councillors resolved to ask James Finch if his Locality budget could consider a grant of:

i. £135 to pay for the street light intelligent lighting system upgrade at Plampin Close

ii. £250 towards the production of a Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebratory booklet incorporating the Welcome to Newton publication.

d. The councillors reviewed NPC's Budget Proposal (Appendix E) for 2012 / 2013 and resolved an expenditure budget of £11,521 and that BDC are given an indication that the Precept for 2012 / 2013 will be set at £9,000. The Precept will be confirmed at the meeting in January.

e. The councillors resolved to apply for Quality Status reaccreditation at a cost of £60.

Planning: a.No planning applications had been received since notice was posted.

b. The status of previous applications, reviewed by NPC were as follows:

Playground and Asset Maintenance Programme: a. The councillors resolved to obtain a quotation for the replacement of the rotten wood identified in RoSPA's report on the play equipment. The councillors will identify a solution to protect children from hitting the heads on the tunnel entrances,

b. The councillors resolved to upgrade the 3 street light units in Plampin Close with the intelligent lighting system at a budgetary cost of £150 but would look to see if a grant from the Locality Budget could be obtained to cover the expenditure.

NPC Survey: Cllr Poole updated the councillors that he had received 128 completed and returned surveys, which is a 56% response based on 226 houses included in the survey. 61% of responses were from households who are all or majority over 60 years of age, 34% 40-59 and 5% under 40...

Unnamed roads in Newton: The councillors reviewed the responses from residents directly affected by the proposal to give names to the 3 unnamed roads on The Green. All residents who have responded support the principle of giving names to the roads and in the cases of School Lane and Mill Lane the names were supported by all residents contacted. However, The Drive was not supported by a minority of residents contacted. The Clerk to review responses with BDC and update councillors at the next meeting.

BDC Core Strategy consultation: The councillors reviewed the documents produced by BDC for the Core Strategy consultation. A summary of the issues / concerns raised will be collated and circulated to the councillors for their agreement before being sent to BDC as NPC's response.

Licensing Act 2003 consultation: The councillors reviewed the issues raised by BDC against the proposal by the Government that "any event or activity with a capacity under 5,000 persons would need no entertainment licence. The councillors resolved that they agreed with BDC that events under 5,000 persons should still be licenced by the district council as at present and that the Clerk to respond accordingly.

SCC's winter preparations: The councillors agreed with SCC's schedule for grit distribution in Newton over the coming winter. The councillors also requested the Clerk to ask that people who spread grit to give their details so that their names could be included in SCC's insurance policy. The Clerk was requested to publicise SCC's advice note on how to spread grit and salt.

NPC's Policies: The councillors resolved to adopt the updates to the Training

and Development policy and the Charitable Giving policy.

Village Hall and Trust representatives update: The VHMC has completed the kitchen refurbishment and are now looking to undertake the decoration of the corridor next.

Newton Green Trust is reviewing the boundaries on the edge of The Green as well as the licences given to residents around The Green. The entrances to the playing field have now been secured. The NGT will be writing to NPC regarding the installation of weight limit signs on the road between the A134

and Sackers Green. There is a meeting planned with residents of Little Green regarding the track on the 23rd November. The vehicular access to Whisper

Question to Chairman: There are a number of initiatives being followed up by councillors on trying to prohibit selling cars in the layby on the A134. Next NPC Meeting: The next scheduled meeting will be on Wednesday 11th

January 2012 starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

The meeting closed at 10.40pm.

Appendix A Public Forum: James Finch (Suffolk County Councillor) updated those present with the latest status of issues regarding the new Chief Executive, Budget, Schools, Libraries and Broadband. Peter Holbrook (Babergh District Councillor) updated those present with the transformation and integration projects, BDC's Budget ,Car Parks, Grants, Licensing and the Core Strategy consultation.

In the absence of the Police the Clerk read the following report ". My report covers the period from Monday 12th September 2011 to Tuesday 9th November 2011. During this time there has been 4 crimes recorded within the parish, this compares to 4 crimes for the same period last year.

One report of Burglary Other Building - Between 1900hrs on Sunday 16th October 2011and 0600 Monday 17th October 2011 a wooden door to a business premises on The Green was kicked open and an untidy search of the property was made. All lines of enquiry have been exhausted and at present there are no to help identify the offender(s) Crime number SU/11/2370 refers. Two reports of Assault / Public Order - At 1600hrs on Sunday 25th September 2011 in Assington Road a known offender was verbally abusive towards the victim. This has been resolved by community resolution. Crime number SU/11/2243 refers OIC is PC834 Hart - At 2330hrs on Saturday 8th October 2011 at a residential property in Airey Close a known offender assault a victim causing actual bodily harm. This matter has since been resolved between the two parties concerned. Crime number SU/11/2345 refer. The OIC is PC1787 Sturman

One report of Theft - Between Monday 19th September 2011 and Sunday 9th October 2011 a large quantity of old English floor bricks and a petrol strimmer was stolen from a barn in Rectory Road. All lines of enquiry have been exhausted and there are no leads as to whom the offender may have been. Crime number SU/11/2328 refers. OIC is PC1337 Pearson."

Newton Parish Council Minutes of Meeting 7th December

Present: Councillors Colin Poole (Chairman), Roy Gardner, Lee Parker, Rita Schwenk and Philip Taylor.

Attending: D Crimmin (Clerk).

Apologies for Absence: Apologies received from Cllrs Presland and Vince. **Declaration of Interests:** None were declared.

Minutes of Meeting held on 9th November 2011: The minutes of the meeting were approved and signed by the Chairman as a correct record. The councillors resolved that in future, one week after the draft minutes of a meeting have been circulated to councillors and unless any amendments or objections are received by the Clerk during that time, that the Clerk will publish the draft minutes to the newsletter and the Newton website. This will ensure that the minutes are published in a timelier manner.

Public Forum: There were no members of the public present.

Planning: a. The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/11/01386 Land (in the Parish of Great Waldingfield) north of New Barn, Valley Road, Newton - Erection of detached stable block including Change of Use of existing Agricultural Land to Paddock / Grazing and resolved to support the application.

b.The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/11/01361 Lilleyfields, Sackers Green - Application of Certificate of Lawfulness of an Existing Use - Continued use of land as contractor's yard for plant and lorry maintenance and storage of road maintenance materials. BDC has asked NPC to provide any local knowledge and general observations to support or contradict the applicant's claim that the site has been used as described above for 10 years. The councillors resolved that they were not able to support the claim of the applicant in this case. The councillors offer the following observations:

Visits by both the Chairman and Vice Chairman to the mobile home on the site during 2010 and 2011 do not support the applicant's claim that the business described was in operation.

ii. Councillors recollection of the yard's use over the years are in line with the Google Earth pictures of the site in 2003 and 2007 which do not support the application

iii. There is contradiction to the yard's use in Planning Application B/06/00111 made by the same applicant in February 2006 when applying for permission for the "temporary siting of mobile home for a period of 5 years" at Lilleyfields. In the application the response to the question "Please describe the purposes for which the land and/or the buildings are now used or the last use – if more than one purpose please give details." was "Livestock

Housing of rare breeds." No other purpose was listed. iv. In the permission given by BDC on 7th November 2008 re Planning Application B/08/01282 for the mobile home at Lilleyfields to have temporary permission for 3 years, BDC stated in point 1 of the permission that "....the land shall be restored to its condition before the use commenced (a hard standing associated with the adjoining agricultural buildings)."
v. Applications for VOSA Licenses for "2 vehicles without trailers" relating

to the property only appear to date back to April 2007.

c. No further planning applications had been received since notice was posted.

Question to Chairman: There were no questions to the Chair but the Chairman briefed the councillors on the initial feedback of the village survey

Next NPC Meeting: Wednesday 11th January 2012

Parish Council Matters

Meetings of Boxford Parish Council held in November 2011 Meeting on 7th November

Public Forum: Members of the public attended to express concern regarding the Goodlands Farm amended proposals. A spokesperson stated that although the number of dwellings had reduced in the latest version, the size of properties had increased resulting in the potential to have similar population numbers and cars. He summed up their issues as overdevelopment and interference with the privacy of neighbouring residents. District Cllr Bryn Hurren agreed to speak to Deborah Board, the Planning Officer and encourage her to come out to see residents. The Boxford Society had expressed concern that the development would take away the existing access to Primrose Wood and to date an alterative had not been suggested. There was no news on the requested traffic survey on Swan Street.

Finance: In addition to the usual business, it was agreed to authorise some necessary work to the Cemetery trees.

Diamond Jubilee 2012: Members examined some potential Jubilee mugs for donation to households in the village. Cllr Norman agreed to take matters forward with the suppliers.

Street Lighting Briefing Report: The Clerk had spent time scrutinizing the briefing report from the County Council and had identified risk factors of the lights failing and not being able to be repaired efficiently in the future. The Parish Council has 5 lights that are not G39 compliant. This relates to health and safety regulations and leads to delays and costly repairs. Additionally the Parish Council owns many lights with mercury bulbs that are no longer manufactured. The solution recommended by the County Council are modern LED lanterns which are guaranteed for 25 years, however, are costly to purchase. Additionally Intelligent Lighting Systems can be installed to all the Parish lights which allow the lights to go out for a period during the night and the capital costs would be recouped from power savings in around three years. It was agreed to invite the Electrical Services Manager at the County Council to attend a Parish Council Meeting to discuss his recommendations. Reports from Members: It was agreed to order a Christmas tree again from Richard Morris to be put up in the Churchyard for the village to enjoy. It was noted the disabled bay outside number 23 Swan Street can be removed. Cllr Egglestone was to continue to investigate a project for skate and bike jumps for older village children. Work continues towards a detailed plan of the Cemetery for burials.

Planning: Confirmations from Babergh District Council:-

- 1) Babergh Council advised permission had been granted for a single storey side extension and front porch at Bishopton Lodge, Calais Street.
- 2) Work can proceed to replace eucalyptus tree with fruit tree at Little Orchard, Butchers Lane
- 3) Work can proceed to fell buckthorn, lime and silver birch at land to the rear of 8 Fen Street
- 4) Work can proceed to halve the height of a conifer at 53 Swan Street.
- 5) Permission granted for work to protected trees at 27 Brook Hall Road.
- 6) Babergh Council confirmed the application for 5 dwellings at Ramree, Clubs Lane had been withdrawn.

The following applications were discussed: -

- a) Proposed development of 21 dwellings at Goodlands Farm. Members voted unanimously to object to the proposals as the number of dwellings proposed are still in excess of the Local Plan despite other significant developments since the Local Plan. In the latest version although the number of dwellings has reduced to 21, the size of individual dwellings proposed has increased so would be more imposing on their surroundings. The Parish Council also cited a number of earlier points that still had not been addressed including traffic audit and access to Primrose Wood.
- b) Proposed single storey rear extension at 75 Daking Avenue. The Parish Council had no objections.
- c) Proposed alterations connected with conversion of barn/ outbuilding to residential annex and link extension at Kemball House, 22 Broad Street. The Parish Council had no objections.

Parish Council Meeting on 21st November

Police Report: PCSO Jamie Fudge was unable to attend, however, had provided a report showing no crimes recorded between 17th October and 14th November. He urged vigilance regarding properties in the process of renovation and building sites. He urged everyone to be aware of neighbouring properties and to report anything suspicious. It was agreed to ask PCSO Jamie Fudge to continue to monitor double yellow lines in Swan Street.

County Council Report: County Cllr James Finch attended and reported on the steps being taken to achieve savings to bridge the budget gap over the next two years. He spoke of achievements in relation to improvement of educational standards across the County and the opening of New Academies and Free Schools. He discussed the new model for the County's library network and proposals for the future of Mobile Libraries. He out-lined plans to secure backing to deliver faster broadband speeds via fibre optic cabling. Other matters covered by his report were the National Grid Electricity

Transmission project, the appointment of Deborah Cadman as Chief Executive of the County Council and the potential for travellers to move from South Essex.

Street Lighting: Cllr James Finch noted it was for the Parish Council to consider what was appropriate, practicable and realistic for Boxford in relation to upgrading the street lighting. It was agreed for the Clerk to undertake a feasibility study to be presented to the December Planning and Finance Meeting.

District Council Report: District Cllr Bryn Hurren was unable to attend however, had provided a report. He had scheduled a meeting with the Planning Officer for Goodlands Farm, Deborah Board. He had received many letters of objection from Boxford residents and was concerned that the County Council had not objected on highways grounds.

Correspondence: The Clerk had circulated her report ahead of the meeting and key areas were discussed. It was agreed to involve the County Council in the matter of hedging obstructing footways in Daking Avenue.

Cemetery: The Cemetery Sub Committee agreed to meet the usual contractor to agree winter projects. It was recommended that the scrub boundary to the cemetery is reduceed by about a third. It was also noted that the lawn cemetery will need marking out.

Reports from Chairman and Members: Cllr Green had attended the Police Priority Setting Meeting and confirmed Community Start (the probation service) is available to carry out work in the area. The Community Car Scheme is going well with details available at the Doctors Surgery.






