SUPERFAST BROADBAND

The Suffolk Campaign for better internet links has gained massive support. Rural communities are rallying together to show their support for a campaign to bring better broadband to isolated pockets of the county. Thusands of families, frustrated by constant internet blackouts, have completed a survey run by Suffolk County Council to prove the level of demand for high-speed broadband expansion.

The surge in support takes the present total to in excess of 2,500 households, while more than 1,000 companies have taken part in the council's ongoing business survey. The council hopes that with more people signing up every day the surveys will encourage broadband suppliers to invest in Suffolk . Mark Bee, leader of the county council and chairman of the Better Broadband for Suffolk campaign said: "The response we've had has been really important that we continue the campaign. We absolutely must demonstrate to ministers and potential suppliers that people in Suffolk need and want better broadband and that our county is an attractive place to invest in. It takes minutes to complete the survey and everyone who does helps to move Suffolk one important step closer to a broadband network fit for the 21st Century. We are moving as fast as we possibly can with the project but strong public and media support is what we need to give the campaign a powerful boost." Last September the county council was awarded £11 million by the Government for high-speed broadband after committing a similar amount themselves. And they are encouraging investors to contribute to the £41.7m needed for the broadband contract across Suffolk.

Suffolk's internet speeds vary dramatically - depending on your address. Large parts of Ipswich and Felixstowe are benefiting from Virgin Media's extensive fibre-optic network - speeds can be as fast as 100 Megabits per second and Virgin is currently planning to double the speed of the connection to most of its broadband customers. But in other parts of the county the average broadband speed is just 5Mbps, with some rural locations struggling along with speeds as low as 0.5Mbps or relying on dial-up connections.

In parts of Ipswich he represents households have been told their broadband will be speeded up from 30Mbps to 60Mbps over the next few weeks but he says a few miles down the oad communities have speeds as low as 0.5Mbps.

Just over the county border, more than 4,000 households in Norfolk have expressed an interest in the broadband programme.

The two counties are expected to cooperate on the installation programme - but each needs to show a level of support for the scheme. Register your support at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/broadband.

GREEN LIGHT FOR NEWTON GOLFERS



Newton villagers can play for nothing on the nine holes laid out on Newton Green. However if they wish to play the full 18 holes at Newton Green Golf Club they have to fork out a full green fee or join the club, paying £650 a year for seven-day membership. The subscription allows them to take a full part in club life, and enter competitions. But now the golf club is to allow residents to take out full membership for only £300 for the first year.

For more than half a century residents have played on the green for free and each household received a bag of coal as rent from the golf club. A few decades ago, with central heating arriving, the coal custom was discontinued, and the club began paying rent for the original nine holes from a new trust set up to administer the land. The deal allows for long-standing access rights to the land for residents to be continued.

The original, 105-year-old nine holes were designed under the supervision of legendary Scottish player and course designer James Braid. Paddy Lockwood, golf club chairman, said already a number of residents were full members of the club, and there were about 30

villagers who played the old nine holes at various times during the year for free. They had to be registered with the club and check in with the professional's shop to make sure they were covered by the club's insurance.

Mr Lockwood added: "A full fee in the first year when they can play half the course for free is a bit off putting for some. We want to make this gesture to encourage residents to become committed full members for the long haul. Newton has a great golfing tradition as a village and we want this to continue."

THE MARCH LETTER FROM REV JUDITH

Dear friends,

I don't know if you've ever watched those television programmes about de-cluttering your lives? Well, I can remember one occasion, before we moved here, when Rufus was in full spring cleaning mode. He was determined to have a great purge on the attic of our small bungalow. I must admit that it had got to the stage where the attic was so stuffed full that we no longer even knew what was up there – let alone why we were keeping it! Does that ring any bells with you? In the end, about six car loads went down to our local recycling centre - old magazines, redundant bits of electronic equipment and much more. Anything which couldn't be recycled was passed on to the next church bazaar. Come to think of it, we had enough stuff to run our own!



I don't know if you're the same, but I find that not only do I work and think better, but I actually feel better, when I'm not surrounded by mess. In my study (which is also my office) at the rectory, if my desk becomes choked up with papers, files, sticky notes (usually telling me what I should have done...), I find my mind begins to feel chaotic, crowded and oppressed too. It is harder to focus, to think clearly and calmly about what I should be doing.

I think it's much the same with our spiritual lives. There are number of stories in the Bible which remind us that we need to spiritually "declutter" ourselves, to clear a way through the mental, emotional and spiritual debris of our lives, the daily clamour of our thoughts and feelings, our "busyness", and to make space for the things in life which really matter.

In the Bible there is a story about a wealthy young man, who comes to Jesus asking how he can find eternal life, a meaningful lasting relationship with God. The young man seems to be doing all the right things in his life, but is still somehow lacking. Jesus recognises that, whilst the man's life is full of material possessions, full even of religious activity, he is spiritually "running on empty". In his case, Jesus felt the only answer was a radical one: Go and give all you have to the poor, then you will find the life with God which is eluding you.

Jesus also told other stories along the same lines: the parable of the man who finds a treasure hidden in a field. In order to buy that one field, to gain the treasure, he is willing to give up and sell everything else that he has. Then there is the parable of the merchant looking for fine pearls. He finds one pearl which is so outstanding, so spectacularly beautiful that he too sells all that he has so that he can buy it. These are all word-pictures conveying a plea to focus on the important.

Sometimes we need a spiritual spring-clean - a spiritual clear-out of our lives. In March, we find ourselves in the church season of Lent, the time when we traditionally remember how Jesus left behind the material comforts of home and focused on the things that really mattered – finding out who he was and what God wanted him to do.

It may not be for us to give up all that we have or to endure such extremities of privation and hardship, but during Lent we can try deliberately putting aside the things in our lives which crowd out and distract us from the things that really matter. And for me, the things that really matter include making more time and space for loved ones and more time and space for God. Happy spring-cleaning!

BOXFORD BIKE CLUB

It has been an exciting and busy start to the year for the Boxford Bike Club. From January the club started its affiliation with British Cycling, the national body for cycling in the UK. This affiliation has brought with it many benefits, including insurance for the club and its members, advice and support as well as offering the club another avenue to attract new members. We have also taken delivery of the new club kit. We're very pleased with the resulting design, which is now being proudly worn by club members.

We held a membership evening in January and, at the time of writing, have attracted around thirty official members to the club. It still amazes us how many riders we have attend the various rides we organise through the week, even as the weather this time of year remains fairly unwelcoming. Seeing over 30 cyclists heading out from the village on a Sunday morning is quite a sight!

The popularity of the club, in some part stems from the accessible nature of the rides we organise. The club's hour long introductory ride, which leaves the village at 9.30am on a Sunday morning, remains a popular choice for those new to the sport, or just starting off. Those wanting more of a challenge leave the village at 8 o'clock for a longer ride. Although the majority of club rides are road rides, we have organised regular off road or mountain bike rides, making use of the tracks and trails which surround Boxford. Our Wednesday night ride heads out from the village at 7pm and will undoubtedly become more popular as the evenings become lighter.

Although it is still relatively early in the cycling calendar, members have already taken place in various cycling events. The Interbike sportive at Mark Tey saw three members complete the relatively hilly (for Essex) 50 mile route, in pleasing times. The more competitive winter mountain bike race series in Thetford saw three members compete in the 2 hour race. The freezing fog engulfing the riders for most of the race!

As well as taking part in cycling events this year the club will be organising its own events. The first of these will be the Boxford Tornado Sportive on Sunday 15th April. This non-competitive event will consist of 3 signposted routes of 20 miles, 40 miles and 60 miles leaving from the playing fields in Boxford and using the pavilion as the event headquarters. Hopefully this event will attract riders from Boxford, but also riders from further afield. Entry to this event will include free post ride refreshments and access to a carefully chosen scenic routes, that will take advantage of the quiet and picturesque rural roads and lanes which surround Boxford. In addition the club is organising a family jubilee ride, to take place on the

Monday morning of the Boxford jubilee celebrations in June. This shorter 6mile route will take in landmarks, churches and pubs in Boxford, Groton and Edwardstone. Included will be a treasure hunt activity for the children. The ride will end in Boxford in time for the jubilee celebrations starting at midday. We are really excited about playing our small part in these village celebrations.

MARCHBOOK REVIEW

What to look for in Winter:

A Memoir in Blindness by Candia McWilliam

When Candia McWilliam was nine her mother committed suicide. Soon afterwards her father remarried but for fearful and sensitive Candia her life was already scarred. By the age of thirteen she was six feet tall but lacking in confidence and feeling odd amongst her friends. But she matured into a very beautiful, articulate and clever young lady, a student at Oxford, where she discovered alcohol.

Her life-long consolation was reading and she became a writer of award-winning fiction. After four books there was a gap of thirteen years, and then this bombshell of an autobiography was published in

By 2006 Candia thought that nothing worse could happen to her. She had been married twice, had three children, and she found life hard. She was a full blown alcoholic and losing her beauty. That year she was invited to join the panel of judges for the Booker Prize, and in the middle of this event she became blind. She was reading nine hundred pages a day, when her eyelids shut down, like closed curtains, and she was forced to enter a world of darkness, without written words to offer much needed solace. She had blepharospasm, a very rare form of blindness and there was no known cure at that time. She could only peer at her world by painfully forcing an eyelid open with finger and thumb. Her consultant explained that twenty years ago she would have been sectioned. Perhaps her blindness was psychosomatic?

This soul searching autobiography explains her agony and cleverly she engages us on a personal level. Her words are dictated to both friends and machines; it is a talking cure for her. What to Look for in Winter is a sad, yet magical read. Don't worry about the hard words, references to the classics and the occasional complex sentence, just bash on through them. You will not be disappointed. Her language is exquisite, her descriptions and perfect use of similes and metaphors make you shiver with delight.

This book captivated and enthralled me. It is not a 'misery memoir' but a delight to inspire those of us who have experienced trauma in our lives. It has a life-affirming ending, and if you're like me, you will return to page one to meet Candia McWilliam again.





"I don't know how to pray......can you help?"

Many people struggle with prayer – and that includes vicars and priests! It should be so easy and so natural, shouldn't it – talking to someone who love us? Because that's what the Christian faith promises us – that our Heavenly Father loves us as his children; that Jesus loves us so much that gave his all for us; that God's

Holy Spirit "The Comforter" is always beside us – whatever happens - ready to guide and support us forever.

Lay Elders:

Even knowing all of this, though, we can still fall into traps when we try to pray. We think that it's something we can only do in church. We think we have to work ourselves up into a very holy and pious state of mind before we can dare to talk to God. We think we have to use special, religious language.

The truth about prayer is so much simpler. God already knows what we need. He knows us



through and through (try reading Psalm 139). He doesn't need us to be in a holy frame of mind or to use religious words – in fact he doesn't need us to say any words at all, although sometimes words can help us. Some of the best prayers are short and honest and from the heart: Lord, I'm in trouble - help me; Lord, my life's a mess; Lord I feel so empty and dry. Or, when things are going well: Lord, thank you; Lord, I love you; Lord, now I understand. All we need to do is find a place, a space, a little time in our day to let his presence, his peace - or perhaps his challenge to us filter through. That space or place could be in your car - ten minutes to sit and be still after the school drop off, before you plunge back into the daily routine, or in your lunch hour, before you return to work. It could be whilst out on a favourite walk or in your armchair. You will gradually find out what works for you. And if you are at home, why not make a "prayer corner" with some simple objects, a few smooth pebbles, a budding twig, a lighted candle, a wooden cross? Make that a special place you know you go can go to whenever you want to, helping to calm and settle you into the presence of the One who knows you, who loves you, and who hears your prayer.

Soap Box

What feels like several lifetimes ago, I was embroiled in a controversy with some of my partners in a business we owned together. The problem was that I had decided to leave my colleagues in order to join a bigger ship, so to speak. The circumstances were hardly controversial. We had been in take-over discussions with our much larger competitor, but the rest of the firm were at odds with me, preferring to stay where they were. To say they made my life difficult was an understatement. As a director, I naturally was bound by restrictive conditions and had a lengthy notice period to serve out. The last thing I wanted was an unpleasant and uncooperative last few weeks in a company I had helped to build – but that is just what I got. I felt they were resorting to tactics that were unreasonable and unnecessary. And I wanted to hit back.

Seeking help from one of the bosses of my soon to be new home, I was advised to cool down and ignore the threats made against me. He used an interesting analogy to describe why I needed to take a step back. Imagine a tree in a field, he said. Two people could look at it from different angles and gain totally separate images of the tree. Yet it was still the same oak or ash they were viewing.

I could see his point. The same set of circumstances could appear very different, depending on your viewpoint. They felt I was running out on them. I thought I was doing the right thing from my perspective and had tried to convince them of the wisdom of taking the path I had chosen. We failed to agree. The fact that subsequent events proved me right gives me little comfort.

Finding the middle ground between two opposing positions can be tricky, but is seldom impossible. The trouble is that the protagonists often refuse to listen to each other. Sometimes it takes a third party to sort out these disagreements. Even this does not always work. What concerns me is the way in which often trivial differences can escalate into all out conflict, with seemingly little chance for compromise.

A contributory factor in these high tech times, with near instant communication facilities, is email, in my humble opinion. The opportunity to fire off a missive, outlining a perceived injustice, or to respond to a message with little thought of the potential consequences of the affect your reply might engender, exists like never before. I am only

too well aware of replying in haste and repenting at leisure.

Unfortunately, as Parish Council Chairman, I find myself arbitrating in a variety of arguments of widely varying merit, many of which should never have reached such a state of affairs. Sometimes the character of one of those involved will create additional tension, or there might be a hidden agenda with one of the parties. Perhaps a previous slight is colouring the attitude of one of the protagonists. But all too often the real problem is that those involved have simply not spoken to each other.

Just recently there have been a few occasions where opposing stances have been struck with little real reason that I can detect. In a small community – like a village, or a benefice even – getting on with one another is important. A survey published recently suggested we were getting worse as a nation in knowing who we were living next to. I would like to think that in our little corner of Suffolk we rated higher than much of the rest of the country. But there again, perhaps the unresolved disputes are simply a symptom of us all growing further apart.

GARDENING IN MARCH HARRY BUCKLEDEE

This month, the days get longer, the sun gets stronger, and the first signs of spring arrive. But beware! Don't let your enthusiasm run away on mild days. Frosts will still be lurking around. It is better to delay sowing and planting if the soil is to wet and cold.

Don't be tempted to buy bedding plants, which the garden centers are selling now it's far too early. Start mulching those beds so to give a helping hand to those plants, which are starting to poke their heads through. Put stakes and other plant supports in to support new growth before it really needs it.

The invasion of moss in lawns is quite a serious problem now. The cause may be bad drainage or impoverished turf. Mowing too close in the Autumn can cause moss to grow and smother the grass. Steps should be taken to correct the poor physical conditions and treat the lawn with lawn sand. Aerate the turf by raking it several times to remove dead grass, debris and moss, then spike the whole area with a four prong fork. This action is important to maintain good drainage so that rain is not allowed to remain on the surface and create conditions ideal for disease. Watch out for patches of Fusarium disease which shows up by patches of dead grass, up to a foot in diameter with a mass of pinky white threads over the patch. Treat with a propriety brand of fungicide, following the manufacturer's instructions. Several applications may be necessary to affect a cure. A good home made mix of Lawn Sand can be made up by using the following: 3 parts Sulphate of Iron, 5 parts Sulphate of Ammonia, 8 parts dry sharp sand or dry fine grade peat. Mix thoroughly and apply to the grass at a good handful per square yard. The Sulphate of Iron will kill the moss and the Sulphate of Ammonia will encourage the grass to grow above the moss. Some blackening of the grass may occur especially if there is no rainfall for two days. but this is only temporary.

The buds of Rhododendron's, Azalias and Camelias which turn brown and fail to open, can be caused by one or two things. It can be frost damage, in which case the damaged buds are soft and can be easily pulled away from the shrub. Or it can be a condition known as Bud Blast, in this case the buds are brown and covered in black hair like growth. The buds remain firmly attached to the shrub and do not rot. Cutting off and burning the affected buds and spraying with a fungicide will help control the disease. Spray with an insecticide to destroy the leaf hopper which is thought to spread the disease from plant to plant. In the case of Camelias, the browning of buds is more likely to be frost damage. Keeping the plants watered in dry weather

will help them withstand an attack.

Over wintering veg, like sprouting broccoli and spring cabbage, will need a two oz per square yard dressing of a quick acting nitrogenous fertiliser like Sulphate of Ammonia, Nitro Chalk or dried blood. Loosening the soil around the plants with a Dutch Hoe will aerate the soil and promote good growth as well as the control of weeds.

Spring flowering pansias, polyanthaus, daisies and wall flowers will all benefit from similar treatment.

Spring usually arrives by mid-March and the frequent sunny days provide the opportunity for an increasing range of gardening tasks. It's time to get busy preparing seed beds, sowing seed, cutting back winter shrubs and generally tidying up around the garden.

Top jobs this month

- 1. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- 2. Protect new spring shoots from slugs
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- 7. Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- 8. Weeds come back in to growth deal with them before they get out of hand
- 9. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days

Apologies: M Ewen, District Cllr J Antill

Declarations of Interest: None.

Police Matters/Speedwatch: No police report received. Speedwatch resumes in March and the new rota has been issued. We now have sufficient volunteers for the village to be independent of members from other villages in the partnership. Concerns have been raised about the speed of traffic leaving and approaching the village down Church Road as there is more pedestrian activity from and to the stable/field now more horses are kept there. A 'Beware of horses' or 'Concealed entrance' sign will be requested as there is limited visibility for those leaving the field. Minutes of the last meeting: These were agreed as a true record and signed.

Matters Arising: B Tora has drafted a newsletter for distribution to raise awareness of new initiatives/issues to all residents. It covers bus service/grit bins/Diamond Jubilee celebrations/village website and more. The PC meal was held on 15 January and enjoyed by all who attended.

Financial Matters: Between meetings a cheque was signed in favour of MTM for the 2 x grit bins.

Planning Matters: Permission has been granted for the removal of an ash tree at 1 Woodhall Barns.

The application for the erection of a farmhouse and further storage facilities at Haymarket was discussed at length. This had been circulated previously to councillors and the Chairman had met with affected neighbours, the applicant and the applicant's agent. Further tree and hedge planting to that shown in the plans has been agreed. If the farmer is living in the village heavy farm traffic is likely to lessen as agricultural machinery will be stored on site instead of needing to be brought in as now. It was decided that providing assurances can be given by the District Council that permission for an agricultural workers dwelling on this site would not open the doors for further development outside of the village envelope, no objections to this application will be made. We will also request confirmation that an 'agricultural tie' will be a condition, as a lack of this has caused difficulties previously.

Correspondence: None received.

Telephone Box: M Ewen is still trying to confirm responsibilities for the electricity supply.

Village Website: There have been 35 'hits' since our December meeting. **Public Transport:** We understand that 3 responses were received from Little Waldingfield to the survey, but this was questioned by members of the public present. An 8 seater taxi on a Thursday may be a possibility if there are sufficient regular users. Options for non-car owners/users will continue to be vigorously pursued.

Diamond Jubilee celebrations: A meeting with representatives from other village groups was attended the previous evening by B Tora, M Ewen and the Clerk. Ideas for afternoon and evening entertainments were discussed and further suggestions are welcome. definitely be organised games for children during the afternoon. Village organisations can 'set up their stall' to raise awareness of what services they provide. The Over 60s offered to run a tea and cakes stall and this was gratefully accepted.

Footpaths: A working party will check and clear footpaths as necessary. The footpath across Park Farm is clear, but some walkers are concerned about the alpacas in the paddock and use an alternative route that is not the designated footpath.

Newsletter: A report will be submitted to the BRN.

Churchyard: No issues have been brought to our attention.

Any other business: The Clerk will investigate the cost of providing a further rubbish bin. There have been complaints about a stray dog in the village. The Clerk will contact Babergh DC.V Flute will distribute the 'Better Broadband' survey.

Litter pick to be held 17 March: Dates of future meetings were set as 21 February, 27 March, 24 April, 22 May (Annual Parish Meeting) and 3 July.

Meeting on 6th December

Finance: Members considered the budget for next year and agreed a nominal increase on the current Precept by 2% bringing it to £33536. The bank mandate forms updating the signatories were duly signed by

Diamond Jubilee 2012: It was agreed to provide a commemorative mug per household in Boxford Parish and order additional ones for purchase.

Street Lighting Feasibility Report: The Clerk had worked on a feasibility report on the potential to upgrade the Parish Street Lighting with LED in view of potential power and maintenance savings. She had investigated a potential grant source that may make the scheme desirable. She had explained details to a representative from the Green Team and was hopeful of getting a letter of support. It was agreed to apply for a substantial green grant with the balance coming from earmarked reserves and a public works loan. Once the outcome of the applications is known, the Parish Council will decide whether to proceed with the upgrade.

Reports from Members: Cllr Green stated traffic issues are of most concern to residents attending the Police Priority Setting Meetings. She has made further progress with the car sharing scheme (details can be found at the Doctors Surgery) and Cllr Norman offered to assist when he is available with his 4x4. The Cemetery Sub Committee agreed to progress the cutting of the hedge between the Churchyard and the School. At the Cemetery (on the Village Hall side of the road) they had agreed for the hedge to be reduced by a third. Cllr Gates confirmed the grit heaps requested for Brick Kiln Hill had been received.

Parish Council Meeting on 19th December

Police Report: PCSO Jamie Fudge was unable to attend, however, had provided a report showing two criminal damage incidents in the parish in the month before the meeting. Both involved fencing damage to a property at Cox Hill. In his report PCSO Jamie Fudge encouraged everyone to be prepared before taking a car journey and if it snows to make sure the snow is cleared from the bonnet and roof of the car as well as the windows.

County Council Report: County Cllr James Finch attended and reported on the County Council's budget recommendations with a 0% increase on Council Tax. He reminded everyone of the importance to complete the Broadband surveys which apply to individuals and businesses. He reported on the outstanding ofsted rating at Pakefield Children's Home. He clarified the Company offering a 25 year warranty on the potential LED street lighting was in the process of being taken over by Philips Lighting who was looking to honour the guarantee. Members asked Cllr Finch to investigate the highways position regarding the proposed Goodlands Development.

District Council Report: District Cllr Bryn Hurren was present to deliver his report and advised the Homefield flats were approaching completion and were to be open for bids in mid January. He stressed the local demand for Affordable Homes was high and the number of applicants bidding for the 8 homes was likely to be high. A site meeting was being arranged for the Development Committee to attend Goodlands. Public toilets were under review to save money. Short stay parking in Hadleigh and Sudbury was not to incur charges for the time being. Work has continued to narrow the budget gap at the District Council and they were considering an increase in Council Tax for their element by 3.5%.

Correspondence: The Clerk had circulated her report ahead of the meeting and key areas were discussed. It was agreed to ask the Cemetery Contractor to mow to the boundary in the north east corner of the churchyard where some planting has been removed.

Finance: A deposit for Jubilee Mugs was paid together with the invoice for work to the Cemetery trees.

Reports from Members: It was agreed to chase County Highways regarding the puddle at the bottom of the Croft. It was agreed to report the missing lettering on the finger post near the Village Sign. The Chairman agreed to issue a letter of thanks to Ian Tippett from Babergh District Council who was to be leaving the District Council. During his time at the District Council, Ian had helped progress many Local Needs Housing schemes in the area.

Parish Council Matters

Minutes of a meeting of Newton Parish Council Wednesday 11th January 2012

Present: Councillors Colin Poole (Chairman), Roy Gardner, Lee Parker, Paul Presland, Rita Schwenk, Philip Taylor and Alan Vince.

Attending: James Finch (Suffolk County Councillor), D Crimmin (Clerk) and 4 members of public.

Apologies for Absence: Apologies received from PC Garrod.

Declaration of Interests: Cllr Taylor declared personal and prejudicial interests in items 12/007a as a payment was to his father and left the meeting while the item was discussed.

Minutes of Meeting held on 7th December 2011: The minutes of the meeting were approved and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

Public Forum: Mr Street, who currently occupies the mobile home at Lilleyfields, updated councillors with the background to the application under review in 12/008a. He stated that he does not work for the applicant in any office depot or security capacity. He also stated that there were no plans for him to work for the applicant if the application was agreed as Mr Street worked for himself. He also stated that the outline for this application and B/11/01361 were designed with the applicant by Babergh officers when they visited the site earlier in the year. The other issues raised during the public forum are contained in Appendix A.

Correspondence (Appendix B): The councillors reviewed the Correspondence received and no further action was required.

Clerks Report (Appendix C): Following a review of the Clerk's Report by the councillors Cllr Parker offered matting for the tunnel in the playing field Finance: a. All cheques signed and due for signing, as itemised in Appendix D, were authorised by the councillors. The councillors also noted the income received since the last meeting and reviewed the Statement of Accounts against the budget and the bank reconciliation against the bank statements. The councillors placed on record their appreciation for the work undertaken by Shirley and Janet Taylor and Liza Devlin for their work in organising the Christmas parcels.

b. The councillors resolved to set the 2012 / 2013 Precept at £9,000 and the councillors and Clerk signed BDC's Precept upon Charing Authority (P2) accordingly.

Planning: a. The councillors reviewed Planning Application B/11/01359 Lilleyfields, Sackers Green - Change of use of agricultural land for siting of a mobile home to be used as a permanent residential pitch by a single Gypsy family. Erection of ancillary store and construction of hard standing. The following observations were made:

1.The councillors referred back to planning application B/11/01361 which sought a Certificate for Lawfulness for the business at Lilleyfields the operation of which is now creating a reason for the mobile home to be moved. It was noted with some frustration that BDC had not determined that application before requiring our comments on a dependent application.

2. The applicant does not own the mobile home he is seeking to re-site and is not the gypsy family in need of a residential pitch.

3. The councillors noted that according to the plans that the mobile home "occupier will act as security to the plant depot machines etc", but the need for a permanent residential pitch for a gypsy family referred to Mr Street, who does not work for the applicant.

4. The councillors were surprised that Mr Street's name did not appear in the application, as had been the case with the temporary permission given. It is the expiry of that temporary permission that gave rise to the need for permanent permission to be sought.

5. The councillors were surprised with the statement that Babergh officers had mapped out the two planning applications (B/11/01359 and 03161) in order for the applicant to get permission to re-site Mr Street's mobile home when the detail in the applications, in NPC's opinion, did not accurately reflect the situation

6. The councillors recalled that the current secluded location of the mobile home was agreed by BDC in order to meet the needs of a gypsy family as a low-key solution to their specific family needs, without the need to intrude further onto agricultural land.

7. If this application was stripped away from background circumstance, it would be very difficult to envisage BDC granting permission to site a mobile home on agricultural land as proposed.

The councillors resolved to give two responses on the application which are dependent on the outcome of planning application B/11/01361 and are to be read in conjunction with the observations above:

• If a Certificate of Lawfulness is granted in B/11/01361 then the councillors reluctantly support the move of the mobile home to the exception site for the occupancy of Mr Street and his family due to the Health and Safety issues faced in the middle of a builders yard. The site should have a limit of one pitch and BDC should ensure that the conditions placed on any permission enables them to take swift enforcement action should the conditions be broken. However, the councillors are of the opinion that the application should have been made by Mr Street.

• If a Certificate of Lawfulness is refused in B/11/01361 then the councillors object to the proposed move of the mobile home and change of use of agricultural land. The councillors would prefer to see an application for permanent permission for the mobile home in its current location and sees no reason why the site cannot be remodelled to get the desired amenity for its residents. The hoggin-surfaced yard could easily be dug up and turned into garden/amenity space. Mr Street should apply for his own permanent permission to retain his mobile home where it is situated.

The councillors also felt that the manner in which BDC was trying to develop

its policy for a permanent traveller and gypsy pitch in the District, via this application, was inconsistent and would set a dangerous precedent which could come back to haunt them in the future.

b. No further planning applications had been received since notice was posted.

c. The status of previous applications, reviewed by NPC were as follows:

Playground and Asset Maintenance Programme: No action was required by the councillors.

NPC Survey: The final analysis of the Survey responses will be completed later this month and the outcomes will be reviewed by the councillors at an extra meeting on the 22nd February at 7.30pm

Unnamed roads in Newton: BDC has stated that it prefers unanimous acceptance by residents to the road names being proposed by NPC in order to facilitate a name being allocated. With unanimous support for School Lane and Mil Lane the councillors resolved to propose these to BDC for adoption. However, with the responses received from residents not unanimously supporting The Drive, the councillors resolved to leave the road unnamed.

Effectiveness of Internal Controls and Internal Audit process: The councillors reviewed the current system of NPC's internal controls and internal audit and resolved that they were satisfied:

• With the review of the Internal Audit as per Appendix E

• That the scope of the audit is in accordance with The Governance and Accountability in Local Councils in England and Wales, A Practitioners Guide 2011 and the guidelines issued by BDO LLP and by the Suffolk Association of Local Councils

• With the report provided by the internal auditor at the conclusion of audit for review by NPC.

• The councillors further resolved that Heelis & Lodge scope of internal audit work was in accordance with the role required to be undertaken by the internal auditor for NPC

• With the Internal Control processes undertaken by the council.

Risk Management register: Following a review of NPC's Risk Management Register the councillors considered that it was appropriate for NPC's operations.

Asset Register: The councillors reviewed NPC's Asset Register and agreed with the contents.

Spring Cleaning in Newton: The councillors agreed to a Spring Clean day on Saturday 24th March 2012 at 8.30am. At the suggestion of a resident, the councillors also agreed to hold an Autumn Clean on Saturday 3rd November 2012, in order that rubbish revealed by the die-back of summer verges should not be left in view all winter.

Village Hall and Trust representatives update: The VHMC has completed the kitchen refurbishment and are now decorating the corridor. It is hoped to work on the outside of the hall during 2012 and the replacement of the sewerage system is now a long term project. Unfortunately the whist drives have been discontinued due to lack of support.

The Newton Green Trust hopes to announce the appointment of a new clerk. The Trust will be taking steps to assert its ownership and control of the layby as part of the village green.

Question to Chairman: • Cllr Vince requested a note, encouraging paper to be put in the paper bank rather than the blue bins, be published to residents. He also requested that a sign be put on the bottle banks informing users of the "other bottle bank". He also requested that SCC be informed of the grass overgrowing the pavement from Whisper Wood to The Deans.

• The councillors agreed with Cllr Gardner's request that Trading Standards be consulted with the record of cars being put up for sale in the layby.

• The councillors agreed with Cllr Presland's suggestion that a meeting with the Queen's Diamond Jubilee committee be arranged for 8.30pm on the 22nd February 2012.

• The Clerk was asked to contact SCC re the missing "Cornard Tye" road sign at the A134 junction with Joes Road and the missing distance sign on the A134 past the A1071 junction coming towards Newton.

Next NPC Meeting: An extra meeting will be held on Wednesday 22nd February 2012 and the next scheduled meeting will be held on Wednesday 14th March 2012. Both meetings will start at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The meeting closed at 9.28pm.

Appendix A Public Forum: James Finch (Suffolk County Councillor) updated those present with the latest status of issues regarding the Budget, Broadband and Ofsted Inspections. James Finch will chase the issues raised with SCC on road safety and the quality of white lines on the roads in the area.

Minutes of the Meeting held at 7.30 pm Monday 16th January 2012 at Edwardstone Village Hall

Apologies for Absence: Paul Clarke J Finch & Jamie Fudge.

To approve the Minutes of the meeting of the 14th November 2011: The Minutes of the 14th November 2011 were approved; proposed by Vice-Chair Sharon Norman, seconded by Jim Robinson

To receive a report from Suffolk Constabulary: In the absence of Jamie Fudge the Clerk reported that, for the period 14th November 2011 to 13th January 2012, there had been no crimes reported and this compared to 3 crimes for the same period last year.

To receive a report from District Council: Bryn Hurren reported that he had been contacted regarding the cleaning of the streets and that Winthrops had been missed out at the last clean and would contact Babergh. Babergh were having problems making the budget balance and it was looking more likely that there could be an increase in local taxation. There would be no car park charges.

The Planning Application for Goodlands: has 7 local need houses planned but the overall planning application was far from satisfactory in terms of highways control and design. The Planning Committee had visited the site and a decision would be made late January. Edwardstone Council had been consulted as an adjoining parish and felt that the reduction in the number of houses in the amendment had reduced the concerns of increased traffic.

Regarding the comments made by Jim Robertson concerning the lifetime criteria, Bryn confirmed that he had spoken to Tracy Brinkley, who was looking into the matter.

To receive reports and questions from Councillors and Members of the Public: At the November meeting it had been agreed that Councillors would do individual research regarding the giving of commemorative mugs to the children of Edwardstone. Daphne Clark reported that she had researched the number of children in the parish to be 61. The mugs that she had found would be £5.00 a mug. The Council agreed that the £300.00 required would be discussed at the Precept.

Highway & Footpath Matters: The Clerk had still not received an answer from BT regarding the maintenance of the telephone kiosk if the Council were to take ownership of it for a pound. Bryn said that he would forward alternative contact details to the Clerk.

Precept 2112/2013: The Councillors discussed the precept for 2012/13. It was agreed that, in order to make a donation for the 2012 Community event and for some form of memorabilia for the children of Edwardstone, the precept would have to be increased. The Councillors discussed at length what the precept increase should be and agreed to a sum of £295.00, making a total of £5230.00 for the year. This equates to an increase of 0.97p per elector; proposed by Chairman Charlie Boggis, seconded by Clare Britcher.The Council also noted that the reserve fund needed to be increased to at least the equivalent of a year's precept and agreed to work towards this.

The Clerk reported that Boxford Parish Council would like to know if Edwardstone Parish Council were interested in joining with a Community Watch Scheme. At this stage they need to secure enough volunteers to make the scheme viable. After much discussion the Councillors agreed that they did not believe it would be of benefit for the parish of Edwardstone.

To receive a report from Suffolk Constabulary: There had been no crimes reported in the period from 2nd November 2011 to 2nd January 2012. This compares to one crime for the same period last year.

To receive a report from Suffolk County Council: In the absence of James Finch, the Clerk read his report.

To receive a report from District Council: Bryn Hurren reported that Babergh were having problems making the budget balance and it was looking more likely that there could be an increase in local taxation. Mark Mayhew questioned Bryn as to the economic viability of the car park warden in view of the free three hours parking. Bryn confirmed that the fines covered all costs and were a good source of revenue for the Council. The Chairman asked Bryn if Babergh had any views of the proposed government return to weekly refuse collections and recycling incentives. Bryn said that at this stage no discussions had taken place.

In relation to the Homefield flats, all 8 would be for rent and so far there were 24 applications. The Planning Application for Goodlands has 7 local need houses planned but the overall planning application was far from satisfactory in terms of highways control and design. The Planning Committee had visited the site and a decision would be made late January. Footpath and Highway Matters:

David Elliott reported that he had had a successful meeting with Paul Gant at Maltings Farm to discuss the ongoing flooding problem and it was hoped that the problem would be now be resolved.

David also took the opportunity to take Paul Gant to see the condition of the road at Groton Street where the sewers had rutted. The Chairman thanked David for meeting Paul Gant and all his assistance in this matter.

Councillors discussed the above application and had no objections. The footpath diversion had previously been discussed at the Council meeting on 1st September 2010 and had had no objections.

Financial Matters Precept 2012/2013: The Councillors discussed the precept for 2012/13 and, after much discussion and consultation, agreed that an increase of £100.00 (£0.45 per elector) was needed to fund the donation to the 2012 A Year to Remember. Therefore, the precept for 2012/13 would be £3950.00; proposed by Gerald Smith seconded by David Elliott.

Chairman's and Clerk's Correspondence: The Chairman Carey Fraulo reported that she had met with Jo Beever from Babergh about grants to help update the village hall and that having a small term lease was not a problem in terms of applying for some funding.

In terms of the lease for the village hall, the Chairman informed the Council that Mrs Caroline Last had kindly agreed to a new ten year lease. The Council agreed that residents of Groton need to be involved in the decision making of their village hall facility and Councillors agreed that some form of questionnaire should be circulated. Therefore the village hall would be a future agenda item. The Council thanked the Chairman for all her work with regards the village hall.




